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President's Message

As I sit on the plane flying to ARNA's 25th Anniversary Convention in Las Vegas, I think back over the last 15 months of my presidency. I chose the theme *Time* to Grow not truly knowing if this would be an achievable goal and wondered how this Board's term



could significantly impact our organization.

I am delighted to say that ARNA has grown and will continue to grow if we remain strong to our guiding principles. These principles are meet the needs of members through active listening, provide resources for members to deliver quality patient care in all radiology venues, and ensure that ARNA remains the primary resource for assisting radiology nurses to be the very best they can be.

ARNA has realized a **30% financial growth** which is higher today than in 2004. This is truly significant! One of the main roles of the Board is fiduciary in nature by overseeing the expenses and revenues of ARNA. ARNA is financially sound and has a strong foundation to grow even further. Some other signs of growth are

- Since March 2005, ARNA has gained 715 new members.
- Since February 2005, there have been 144 newly certified CRNs.
- As of March 2003, ARNA has certified 552 nurses as CRNs.
- · Our very own 2006 Convention had 528 registrants.
- ARNA now has a new interactive Web site.
- We are the recipient of two grants: Gerontology and Education (Berlix).

ARNA continues to be active in professional organizations. As a result of our participation in The Alliance of nursing specialties, ARNA will participate in the TIGER Summit next October. At this gathering, only invited nursing organizations will formulate information technology competencies for all practicing clinical nurses (and that includes radiology nurses). The Society of Interventional Radiology (SIR) and American College of Radiology (ACR) continue to ask for ARNA members to participate on committees because of our nursing and radiology knowledge expertise.

Approval of our newly revised practice standards by the American Nurses Association (ANA) is presently occurring and, if things go well, ANA will publish them shortly.

As a result of listening to members, we realized we needed ARNA to find a way to provide a venue where radiology nurses could "specialize" within the specialty. Thus, the Special Interest Groups (SIGs) were born. The purpose of each SIG is to encourage networking and relating information pertinent to practice. These radiology nurses have a concentrated interest within advanced practice, management/leadership, gerontology, and pediatrics. The Program Planning Committee used this format for concurrent sessions at the convention.

The Certification Preparation Course continues to be very popular. Based on the task force's recommendations and your evaluations, the workshop has grown into two days. The latest count prior to the workshop this year was 125 enrollees. Several facilities have asked

It is my honor to announce the name of the recipient of ARNA's first Radiology Nurse of the Year award. This award was established in January 2006 by the ARNA Board of Directors and is presented to an ARNA member in recognition of outstanding radiology nursing practice which is demonstrated through leadership, mentorship, and ongoing professional development.

There are four criteria that determined the winner:

- Evidence of ongoing education relevant to radiology nursing
- Adherence to standards of practice appropriate to radiology nursing
- Advocates for quality patient care
- Demonstrates leadership and is a role model for excellence in radiology nursing

ARNA's first Radiology Nurse of the Year Award recipient is **Patricia Barry Doohan, RN, AD**, who was recognized at the ARNA 25th Anniversary Convention on June 24, 2006, in Las Vegas, NV. Patricia was presented with a plaque, a one-year complimentary ARNA membership, an ARNA pin, and a letter of recognition.



Patricia was nominated by ARNA member, Kathleen Gross, MSN, RN, BC, CRN, a Past President and current JRN Editor. Kathleen wrote: "Patricia has given unselfishly of her time and talents in so many ways. She always welcomed the newcomer to ARNA meetings and displayed much pride over the accomplishments of ARNA and her peers who have advanced the specialty of radiology nursing. Legislative Update

Our country is going through a critical nursing shortage now that will only get worse in the future. The Department of Health and Human Services estimates that the United States will face a nursing shortage of 29% by 2020. Action is needed now to help prevent this future shortage.

Nursing workforce programs are administered by the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) through Title VIII which provides the primary source of funding for nursing education and recruitment. Current funding levels will not meet the growing need for nurses. President Bush's budget requests \$150 million for nursing education programs for 2007. In order to appreciate how little this appropriation really is, in 1974, 32 years ago, Congress appropriated \$153 million for nurse education programs.

Title VIII funding provides support for nursing from entry level to graduate level. It provides grants to nursing schools for advanced practice nurses. Grants are also used to encourage individuals from disadvantaged backgrounds to enter the nursing profession. Additionally, grants are given to encourage retention at hospitals.

Title VIII administers the Nurse Education Loan Repayment Program (NELRP), which encourages nurses to work at disproportionate share hospitals, departments of public health, and nursing facilities which have been determined to have a critical shortage of nurses. If the nurse's application is accepted, NELRP will repay 60-85% of student loans in return for the nurse working full time for at least two years in one of the above areas.

The Nursing Scholarship Program provides scholarships to nursing students. These students agree to work for at least two years in a facility that has been deemed to have a critical shortage of nurses.

The impact on nurses and potential nurses is huge. In the fiscal year 2005, 82% of the applicants for NELRP were turned down because of a lack of funding. This means that areas with critical shortages lost a potential 3,662 registered nurses for their facilities. During this same time, 98% of applicants for scholarships were refused because of a lack of funding.

This shortage impacts the ability to treat patients in a safe manner. There are published studies in the *New England Journal of Medicine* and the *Journal of the American Medical Association* that indicate that the nursing shortage impacts complications that could have been prevented. The Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations reported that the shortage of nurses is a factor in a quarter of all "unexpected incidents that kill or injure hospitalized patients."

In the Senate, Barbara Mikulsi (D-MD) and Susan Collins (R-ME), and in the House of Representatives, Lois Capps (D-CA) and Steven LaTourette (R-OH), have circulated letters to their colleagues asking for support for a 17% increase in funding, to \$175 million, for nursing workforce development programs.

Contact your members of Congress TODAY and urge them to support the \$175 million funding for the fiscal year 2007. Nurses need to take action today for the nurses of tomorrow!

Mid-South Chapter

The Mid-South chapter has been recently organized as a new local chapter for radiology nurses in the Kentucky and Tennessee regions. Our main focus is education and quality of care for the patient undergoing radiological testing and procedures. We have hosted an educational presentation on creatinine clearance in response to an increase in the number of diabetic patients receiving contrast in March 2006. Our chapter also coordinated a symposium on *Sedation Options in the Radiology Setting for Pediatrics and Adults*. Both of these presentations awarded contact hours.

Our next educational presentation is on vascular access options and care. These educational sessions are sponsored by a representative who provides meals in addition to the education and contact hours.

Our chapter is pleased to announce that at least nine members attended the annual convention in Las Vegas while three members were speakers.

Both publications continue to progress and meet their deadlines for publication. Members and Board members are encouraged to submit articles for both publications to help build the pool of articles available.

The Board has been given the charge to begin developing position statements and fast facts. We reviewed several from other organizations to use as guidelines. In the past, we have also endorsed position statements from other organizations rather than writing our own.

This year ARNA marks the first Radiology Nurse of the Year Award. The winner, Patricia Doohan, RN, AD, was announced at the convention in Las Vegas at the Gala Event.

From the Orientation Task Force

ARNA established the Orientation Task Force to address the orientation needs of experienced nurses who are new to radiology. Nurse managers and radiology directors also have expressed need for a program on which to base their department-specific orientation for RNs new to the organization. I have had the privilege of leading this endeavor, working with a dedicated group of experienced radiology nurses who are committed to providing members with a high quality program.

Over 525 radiology nurses attended ARNA's 25th Anniversary Convention in Las Vegas from June 22-25, 2006. A large portion of these nurses packed lecture rooms to hear components of the Orientation Manual for Radiology Nurses. Topics presented included "Radiology Nursing 101," "Radiology Procedures and the Nurse's Role," "Contrast Administration," "Pharmacology A through Z," "Moderate Sedation," and "Scope of Practice within the Radiology Setting." Members posed many questions for discussion and a significant amount of information was shared. The Task Force presenters were energized by the response to this program and requested feedback from those attending each session. Our hope is to add, clarify, or amend the material presented based on these suggestions. We are awaiting ARNA's compilation of this information.

I have received numerous inquiries as to the status of the orientation program, so I would like to provide an update on the status of the Orientation Manual for Radiology Nursing. The Task Force members have completed the didactic material with a portion of this material presented in Las Vegas as stated. We are anxiously awaiting your reviews of this material and will adjust the material accordingly. Concurrently, the manual is under review for consistency with ARNA materials published to date (e.g., Core Curriculum for Radiological Nurses, the CRN Review Course, and Fast Facts), ARNA's latest method of providing information to practicing radiology nurses in a concise manner. The program is also in the midst of a trial evaluation under the direction of current Board members.

Our goal is to produce quality information that nurse leaders and radiology administrators may use to guide experienced nurses into radiology nursing. We know how much this program is needed and wanted by our colleagues.

Please be patient. Quality takes time! I urge you to watch the ARNA Web site for updates as the program becomes reality.
